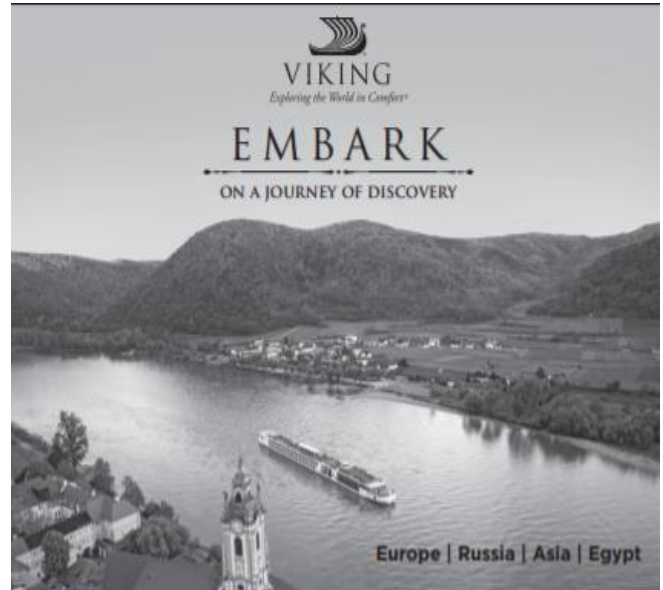

CORONAVIRUS



Important information on Coronavirus - COVID-19

This information was forwarded to me from a hospital official and I thought it was an interesting read for what's going on at the present time. Please read and I hope this helps us all understand the virus a bit better. Thank you, Joyce Middleton.

This is their feedback for now on Corona virus: The new Coronavirus may not show sign of infection for many days. How can one know if he/she is infected? By the time they have fever and/or cough and go to the hospital, the lung is usually 50% Fibrosis and it's too late. Taiwan experts provide a simple self-check that we can do every morning. Take a deep breath and hold your breath for more than 10 seconds. If you complete it successfully without coughing, without discomfort, stiffness or tightness, etc., it proves there is no Fibrosis in the lungs, basically indicates no infection. In critical time, please self-check every morning in an environment with clean air.

Serious excellent advice by Japanese doctors treating COVID-19 cases: Everyone should ensure your mouth & throat are moist, never dry. Take a few sips of water every 15 minutes at least. Why? Even if the virus gets into your mouth, drinking water or other liquids will wash them down through your throat and into the stomach. Once there, your stomach acid will kill all the virus. If you don't drink enough water more regularly, the virus can enter your windpipe and into the lungs. That's very dangerous.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT - CORONAVIRUS

- If you have a runny nose and sputum, you have a common cold
- Coronavirus pneumonia is a dry cough with no runny nose.
- This new virus is not heat-resistant and will be killed by a temperature of just 26/27 degrees. It hates the Sun.
- If someone sneezes with it, it takes about 10 feet before it drops to the ground and is no longer airborne.
- If it drops on a metal surface it will live for at least 12 hours - so if you come into contact with any metal surface - wash your hands as soon as you can with a bacterial soap.
- On fabric it can survive for 6-12 hours. normal laundry detergent will kill it.
- Drinking warm water is effective for all viruses. Try not to drink liquids with ice.
- Wash your hands frequently as the virus can only live on your hands for 5-10 minutes, but - a lot can happen during that time - you can rub your eyes, pick your nose unwittingly and so on.
- You should also gargle as a prevention. A simple solution of salt in warm water will suffice.
- Can't emphasis enough - drink plenty of water!

THE SYMPTOMS

- It will first infect the throat, so you'll have a sore throat lasting 3/4 days
- The virus then blends into a nasal fluid that enters the trachea and then the lungs, causing pneumonia. This takes about 5/6 days further.
- With the pneumonia comes high fever and difficulty in breathing.
- The nasal congestion is not like the normal kind. You feel like you're drowning. It's imperative you then seek immediate attention.

Last month we reported that The Emergency Preparedness Team would meet in mid-March to begin planning for the 2020 'Hurricane Season' which begins June 1st and ends November 30th.

As everyone knows, our lives and many of our regular activities have been disrupted by the medical emergency created by the emerging coronavirus.

LHV Management has taken action to protect residents, including closing the clubhouse and limiting other activities. We support this action as many of our residents may be vulnerable to this virus. It is wise to take whatever precautions we can to protect our residents. Some of these actions may be inconvenient or uncomfortable but are necessary at this time to protect everyone's health.

As one of our Team Members mentioned to me, it is ironic that the activities of the Emergency Preparedness Team have been affected by this national emergency!

The March 18th Team meeting has been cancelled. We will reassess this matter over the next few weeks to determine our future course of action.

In last month's article in **Gator Tales** the Team listed a number of areas to guide our planning in 2020. We also included a copy of the **LHV Zone Map & Volunteer Listing** for your information and review.

At this time, it is difficult to think about anything other than the coronavirus. As you go about your activities please remember that 'Hurricane Season' will be here soon. We are pleased to see that this current situation has not resulted in any widespread 'panic buying.' So far, food and other necessities have been available, except for a few items such as toilet paper, tomato sauce, tuna fish, and bread. To date the supply system seems to be working well, and most items, including those mentioned, are being restocked regularly. We hope that this continues for the duration of this crisis.

This is a good time to begin purchasing some items for the future. Right now, batteries and water seem to be in good supply. We suggest you add a few items to your list each time you shop. This will give you a head start when 'hurricane panic' sets in and suddenly shelves are bare. We urge you to think ahead and plan. We hope this crisis ends soon but know that hurricane season is just around the corner.

The HOA Emergency Preparedness Team is here to help in any way we can. Our purpose is to **help each other, help keep our residents safe, and try to help everyone be better prepared in times of emergency.**

Our general plan is to build on the system set up last year. In a 'trial run' late last season when a hurricane threatened, the zone system worked well. When the Team meets, we will review this and plan for the 2020 hurricane season.

Before going on, I would like to recognize Joyce Middleton and Jerry Sibila for their extraordinary efforts to help establish our Emergency Preparedness Team. As Past President of the HOA, Joyce and the HOA Board supported this plan and authorized us to move ahead. When Jerry became President, he not only continued this support, but was a key member of the Team, attending all meetings and taking part in all activities.

We also thank the HOA Board for its continued support. We thank outgoing Board Member Pamela Leland for all her work on the HOA Board and as a member of our Team. I would also like to recognize Pamela's efforts to organize a CPR Training session here at LHV. As I understand it, the results were amazing and many here at LHV were trained in CPR. Pamela has been a member of our Team and we look forward to working with her again this year.

We would also like to recognize Wayne Saunders for all the work he has done for the Team. As one of our original members, Wayne has been instrumental in our success. He also assumed the role of 'liaison' to the residents who are snowbirds. Without his efforts we would not have been able to make the progress we have in this area. Wayne and Carol have sold their home and are moving back north. We all wish them the best for the future. LHV will not be the same without them! So, thanks Wayne! And our best wishes to you & Carol for the future!

The 'New' HOA Board has met several times so far in 2020. We appreciate their support and welcome new Board members Terry Hofer and Matt Rice.

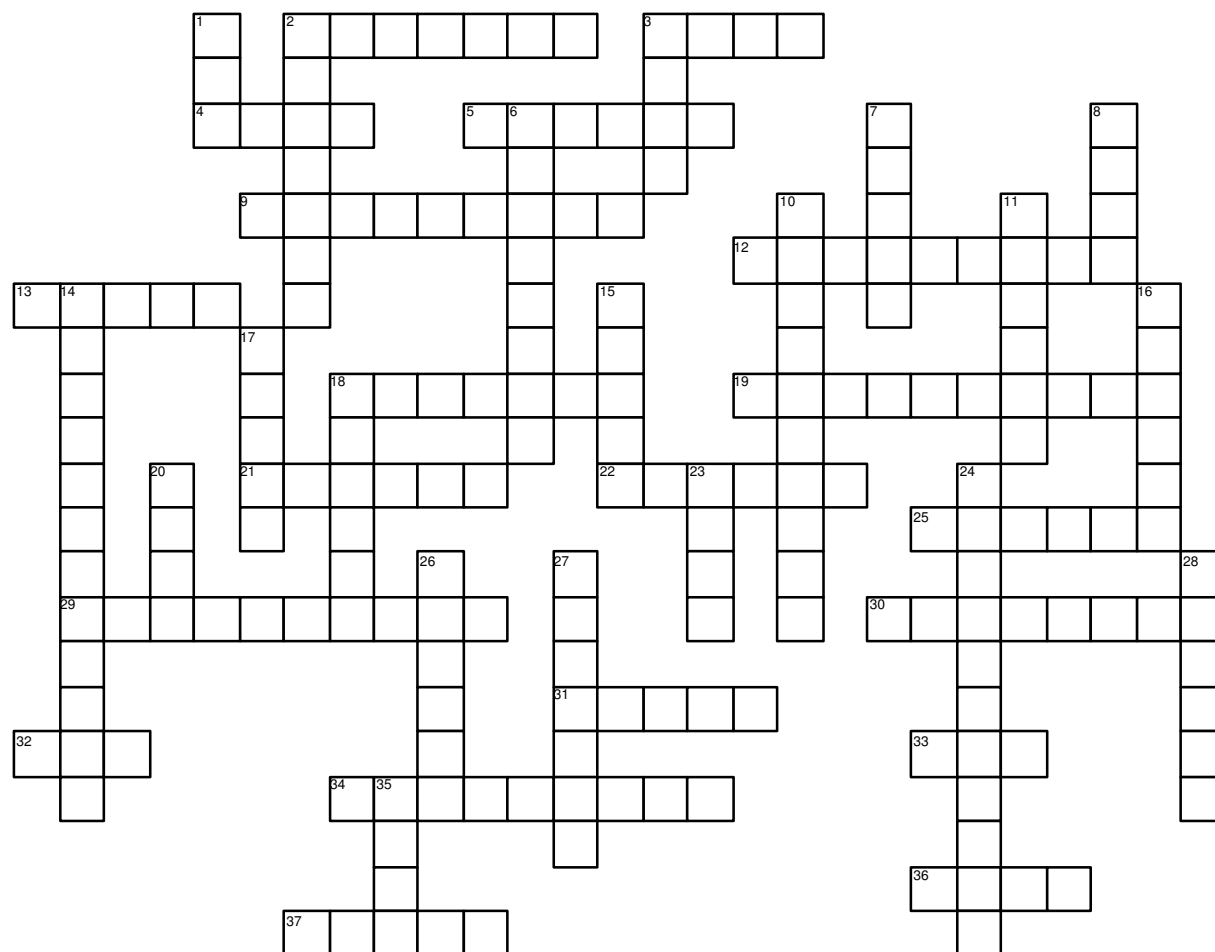

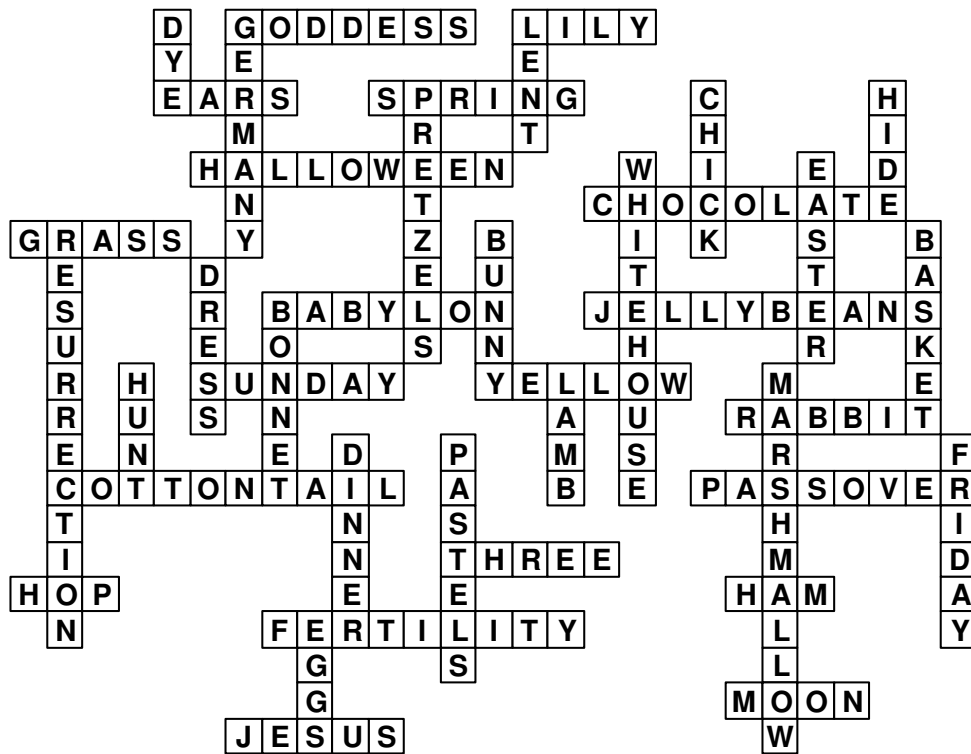
