Hurricane Season Update:

Hurricane Preparation Still Important!

We are now well into hurricane season and thankfully have not experienced any serious threats – yet! We must continue to be vigilant, keeping careful watch for possible danger from sudden hurricanes. We have been very fortunate to date. Other states, such as Louisiana, have suffered tremendous loss and damage. Even New York in the northeast has been affected.

As many of you know, things can change suddenly. Tomorrow we could be faced with a storm coming right at us. Everyone needs to keep a close eye on the weather. The HOA Emergency Preparedness Team has been watching this closely. Team member Jerry Smith has been sharing updates with all of us through Facebook posts and other methods. We all thank Jerry for his efforts! All of us are ultimately responsible for our own safety and preparation.

The bottom line is that in the past September and October have been the most active months for hurricanes. As always, we urge everyone to:

- Watch the weather. This can change quickly!
- Make sure you have supplies. The recommendation is for a '7 Day Emergency Kit' in case electricity goes out. See the hurricane shelter map (distributed to all residents) for more information on this.
- Think about what you would do if a hurricane was headed our way tonight! Would you evacuate? Where? Are you equipped to stay? What about pets? Lots of things to think about better to think about them now not when a hurricane has us in its sights!
- Keep an eye out for your neighbors. Do any need help?

The following article is from a Florida Division of Aquaculture Bulletin from July 2020:

Florida leads the nation in direct hurricane hits for the period 1851 to 2019. Florida experienced 50 major hurricanes (Category 3 or greater) during this period as compared to the next highest states: Texas (25), Louisiana (22), North Carolina (10) and South Carolina (8). Thirty-eight percent of all U.S. hurricanes have hit Florida; 70 percent of hurricanes at a Category 4 or higher have hit either Texas, Louisiana or Florida. The threat of major hurricanes increases from west to east as the hurricane season progresses each year. As such, Texas and Louisiana are the prime targets for early season hurricanes, while the east coast of Florida is most likely to be impacted in October each year. Regardless of this trend, September remains the peak of hurricane season with as many major hurricane landfalls as October and August combined. The earliest hurricane on record to strike Florida was Alma on June 9, 1966, while the latest to strike Florida was Kate on November 21, 1985. Six of the top ten costliest hurricanes in U.S. history have impacted Florida. The state's population is increasing an average of 1.6 percent annually, with 1.3 million more residents from 2010 to 2016. As Florida's population continues to expand, projected at 25 million by 2030, the economic impacts from hurricanes are also increasing. Population growth is predominantly occurring less than 50 miles from the coastline, further exacerbating the potential economic damage. For example, all three hurricanes making U.S. landfall in 2008 made the top 30 list of costliest hurricanes in U.S. history, despite none of them being major hurricanes at

landfall. Fortunately, due to an increase in hurricane preparation, planning and forecast and warning systems the number of fatalities per hurricane is in decline. The perpetual threat of hurricanes in Florida, in combination with the state's growing population and economy, emphasize the importance of wise business planning and storm preparedness.

The Haines City Library and the Polk Library System: Great Resources!

A great resource for new residents or for others who haven't accessed it is the Polk County Library Cooperative, which includes the Haines City Library.

When we moved here five years ago from New Hampshire where we lived in a small town of about 3,000 residents, we had no idea about the library facilities. In New Hampshire the Town Library was located in a two-story building, a large former residential home which was donated to the town and moved to a location close to Town Hall. It was a small, homey, and wonderful place. Despite its size, limited staff, and the smallest budget of any town department, the library served all residents through a number of different programs, from tiny tot story time to book clubs, to educational seminars, and lots more. The librarians knew everyone by name and were always friendly and helpful. It was a very important part of the local community. I have heard people say that libraries are no longer important in this digital age. I strongly disagree. Libraries serve a number of functions in addition to lending books. Our local library is also a community center with different things and diverse activities going on all the time. This includes book clubs, arts and crafts, and other community organizations which meet there regularly free of charge.

The Haines City Library offers something for everyone. The building itself, next to City Hall, has a large lobby with an adjacent large community room, restrooms, and seating for anyone. On many occasions I have seen job recruitments here. Employers sometimes post available jobs and are there to interview individuals — and this is all before you enter the library! Once you enter there are about twenty computer stations to the right for use of anyone who needs access but may not have internet service at home. There are also copying facilities at a small cost if you need things copied.

The best part of the library is the wonderful staff, ready to help you in any way. There is also a children's room and young adult area.

The Haines City Library is part of the Polk County Library Cooperative, which means that all libraries in Polk County share access to books, CD sets, and other materials. A good example is that I just received a current book from one of my favorite authors, Brad Thor, by requesting a 'HOLD' on the Polk County Library Collaborative website. Because this is a brand-new book, there was a waiting list, and I was automatically placed on the list to receive it as soon as a copy became available. I think there were about twenty people ahead of me. When a copy became available, I received an e-mail and picked it up at the Haines City Library. The book is stamped 'Bartow Public Library.' I have two weeks to read it and return it. This book sells for \$ 28.99 and is currently on sale for \$ 14.99 at amazon.com. I will get it for free! For those of us with limited storage space for books this is an added benefit. I can read it for free and then return it – a great deal for me!

Another recent development is that some current books are available for 'digital lending.' For example, I was interested in a nonfiction book by Bob Woodward. When I found it on the website, I noticed it was available in digital format if I had a Kindle device (which of course I do). When I clicked this option, I was informed that the book would be downloaded to my Kindle, and I would have two weeks to read it. I just received an e-mail telling me that my time is up, and the book will be 'returned' in three days. Books are available in regular form, large print, and sometimes on Audio CD. This is something we access regularly, especially when traveling.

The Polk County Library Cooperative is a great resource available to anyone. All you need to do is sign up for free for a library card and then register online! So, think about signing up and enjoy the multiple benefits available through this excellent system! Happy reading!

Cord Cutting

I am sure most of you have also gotten pretty sick of cable bills that keep going up. I cut the cord a while ago when my Spectrum bill hit \$200 a month and I have never missed having cable TVs. Of course, you really can't get away from Spectrum completely because there is no competing internet service that I know of yet. If you disconnect your television service, the current cheapest internet Spectrum offers is 200 mbits/sec for \$74.99 and there is currently no tax on this service. I personally think their internet is pretty good and use it every single day reliably. I can't recommend Frontier because their internet is pathetic and weak 90s DSL which you can't even stream on. However, if all you want is email and web browsing no video, then its fine and cheap. They have not run their Fios fiber optic service into the park for whatever reason. I wish they had we would have a choice then. Starlink which is a more expensive alternative is brand new and not currently available in our area yet, but it starts at \$99 a month and requires a substantial initial up-front cost. It will definitely be better than another satellite service though, so keep an eye out if you are interested and dislike Spectrum. Just a note, and I haven't switched yet, but if you dump their home phone service in favor of using your cell phone exclusively, they offer cell service for \$15 a month with 1 gig of data. This is VERY reasonable and is using Verizon's network. You can also get unlimited data for \$45 a month. You must have their internet for these prices. I plan on trying it in the future.

Options if you want to continue watching local programming:

- TV Antenna free no internet required.
- Streaming requires Spectrum internet.

Roof mounted TV antenna works for local channels. They come in well and look great, I can pick up both Orlando and Tampa market stations. Tampa is easier and more reliable to pick up for me. I was not able to use an indoor antenna at all. I currently pick up 120 stations most of which I would never watch, but all the majors are available. ABC, NBC, CBS, FOX, PBS, CW, MOR TV, MY TV, ION, several Spanish channels and religious networks. Aim your antenna to 246 degrees for Tampa stations and 43 degrees for Orlando stations. I point mine at 243 and get both currently. Channelmaster.com recommends point at Orlando. https://www.channelmaster.com/pages/free-tv-channels#address=&zip=33844
If you have a smart phone, it should have a compass app to get the desired direction.

For an antenna I have used:

- ClearStream MAX-V UHF/VHF Indoor/Outdoor Antenna, 60+ Mile Range, 4K Ready C2MVB \$69 amazon.com or walmart.com
- Channel Master ULTRAtenna 60 \$89.99 at channelmaster.com

Both works well but the ClearStream seemed better to me. You can spend more for their bigger brothers that might pull the signals better as they double the surface area and elements for reception. I also had to use an amplifier for the Channelmaster. The \$15 one from Walmart failed within 6 months so I bought a better quality Winegard LNA-100 Boost at amazon.com \$28. I would have to recommend the ClearStream as its nicer looking, cheaper and didn't require an amplifier.

You will also need pole masts to mount the antenna to the house (RCA Roof Antenna Mounting) for about \$9 each, you will need 4 or 5 of them to go from the ground past the roof. You will also need Mounting brackets. I used Skywalker 12" Heavy Duty Wall Mount \$40 at amazon.com but I wished I used 14" as I ended up having to offset them. You will also need a grounding clamp and grounding wire to run to an existing ground either, your gas meter or cable system ground. You could also use a 4-foot grounding rod too.

Last but not least, you will need enough coax cable to run from the antenna down to your TV. You can use your existing cable tv run in some case and just barrel connect to it.

The antenna masts, grounding rods, clamps, wires and connects can all be purchased at Loews.

If you want a project to do yourself, for less than 200 - 250\$ you can pick up local channels and ditch cable. It will be a little more if you have to pay someone to install it for you, but it will pay for self in a matter of months.

The Tampa market has already cut over to the new ATSC 3.0 broadcast system which will eventually allow them to broadcast in 4k. TVs starting this year will have ATSC 3.0 turners which can use those signals which have better range, resolution and sound. You can read all about it here: https://www.atsc.org/nextgen-tv/

Streaming is more complicated as there are a lot of choices, but all will require you to have Spectrum internet. You will also need a streaming device. Your TV might have some built in or you might have to purchase a device such as Roku or Apple TV for example. There are several worth talking about. But first let's look at the services available.

Nearly all the services have a free trial to see if you like it. They will all require you to read what you are getting. I would suggest you write down what you must have for watching. They all offer similar packages but some might not have MTV, Discovery, Halmark, ESPN or Turner Classic Movies. Some might have a lot of overlap if you need more than one. They all want a piece of the Netflix pie so they are all pulling in their content to their own walled gardens.

The only option I know of that for CHEAP and legal locals is Locast.org. It's free but will annoy you with their nuisance ads until you delete or cave and donate. They want you to "donate" \$5 a month and I'm pretty certain you will want too as well. I tried it out for a while and the quality isn't bad, not great but hey if you don't want to install an antenna then this is you cheapest option. It doesn't offer anything else apart from locals.

Hulu has many plans starting at \$5.99 a month. At this price point the programs are add supported but not as many as live. So, an hour-long show is usually around 50 minutes with their support adds versus 38-43 minutes add free which is their next level up at \$11.99 a month for add free shows. You should look at what they offer, as a lot of shows are offered the following day. For instance, Americas got Talent will air Tuesday night and will be available on Wednesday night to stream. At the 64.99 level you get everything in Hulu plus local's channels and a variety of cable channels. They also include cloud based (internet) DVR but I have never used one so I can't speak to how well it works.

There are add-ons you can purchase as well like Showtime or HBOMax. You will have to weigh these options as you are getting back into cable TV price ranges. Disney does offer a bundle price for Hulu, Disney+ and ESPN.

YouTube TV comes in one size, expensive but it's very highly rated. They offer 85 channels at their price point. They offer sports networks like NFL, NBA, and MLB and they offer PBS which Hulu doesn't. They also offer the addon networks like HBOMax and Showtime, they also offer a 4k upgrade as well.

As you can see, there are a lot of choices and things you will need to consider. You will need to look at what is right for you and your budget. For instance, Hulu without adds and Locast for \$17 a month might fit for you and save you a bunch of money without much sacrifice. All of this is a rabbit hole that you can spend a lot of time reading about, but I saved \$100 a month so it was worth it for me.

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


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
