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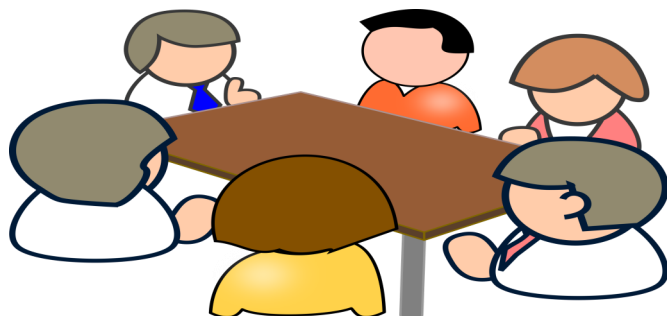

Spotlight on Shuffleboard

This reporter has never played shuffleboard outside. My only experience was an indoor one with lots of sawdust on it at the local VFW when my father took me there. I kept promising myself I'll play and now I really hope to start soon. My friends and neighbors can hold me to that!

Watching everyone play seems like a great way to spend about an hour, joking around with each other, regardless of the temperature. Today you need a sweatshirt and tomorrow it could be shorts!

I feared my preliminary research on this game would be dull at best but found it interesting to see that Henry VIII played a version of the game until billiards made an appearance. Then in the early 1900's, a gentleman named Robert Ball added a court to his home in Daytona Beach which ultimately led to the formation of clubs along with official regulations. The St. Petersburg Shuffleboard Club began in 1924 with two courts and due to its popularity, expanded to 116 courts in 1939.

By the 1960's club participation dropped significantly with the St. Petersburg Club down to 35 members. Since the early 2000's it has made a bit of a rebound.

Shuffleboard has now become an amateur pastime. Since it is low impact and not physically demanding, it attracts older players.

At first look, the game seemed easy enough to play. There are 8 discs of 2 different colors for 4 team members. The game is over either when the score reaches 75, a pre-determined score, or when the scoreboard has reached its end. This park plays until a score of 50 is reached or until the scoreboard has reached the end..

The disc is pushed by a cue stick which is held in a very particular way, almost as an extension of your thumb. When playing, players strategize where they want the disc to land so they can obtain the most points for that round.

There are rules as to how a score is counted, which at first appears complicated. Sometimes it's okay to score while the disc is on a line and other times when it is not. There is a "kitchen" where you minus 10 points to your score and a time when your disc can be removed from the court altogether if it doesn't reach the lag line.

Many residents here enjoy this pastime and are happy to teach others how to play.

There are some safety tips that one should be aware of before playing. Not stepping on a disc probably ranking high on that list. If you step on it, you will more than likely fall as if you slipped on ice. How you hold your cue stick is important as well. Keep it vertical so nobody gets hurt. All these things can be learned.

Go there and have fun! Call me and make me go with you!

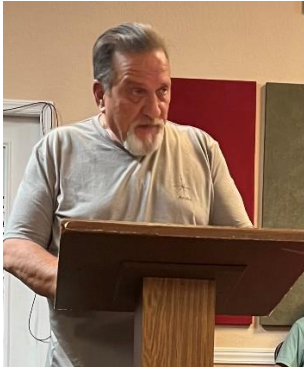

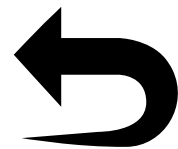

Golf Carts in the Sunshine State

Golf carts seem ubiquitous in Florida, so it probably wouldn't surprise you to know that Florida is one of the top states for golf cart usage with only Georgia and South Carolina ahead of us.

Using a golf cart to get around instead of a car or truck certainly has its advantages, but before you go out to buy one, you should know that you can't drive them anywhere, and not just anyone can operate one.

Operating a golf cart on public roads is generally prohibited, but there are exceptions. I recommend that if you have a golf cart or plan on getting one, make sure you check Florida State Statute 316.212 for all the exceptions.

Even though golf carts are not classified the same as cars and trucks, they still have to be operated in the same manner in regards to traffic laws. They must comply with stop signs and traffic lights, and yes – you can most definitely be arrested for driving a golf cart while intoxicated.

A new law in Florida addressed the age of those driving golf carts on designated public streets. Anyone 18 and over must have a valid government issued ID (or Drivers License) with them while operating a golf cart. Those drivers under 18 years of age must also have a valid driver's license or a learners permit.

Some might think that golf carts can't be too dangerous since they're only designed to go about 20mph, but a sudden stop at that speed or a sudden turn resulting in a roll over can prove to be fatal.

Know before you buy, and be safe when you drive.

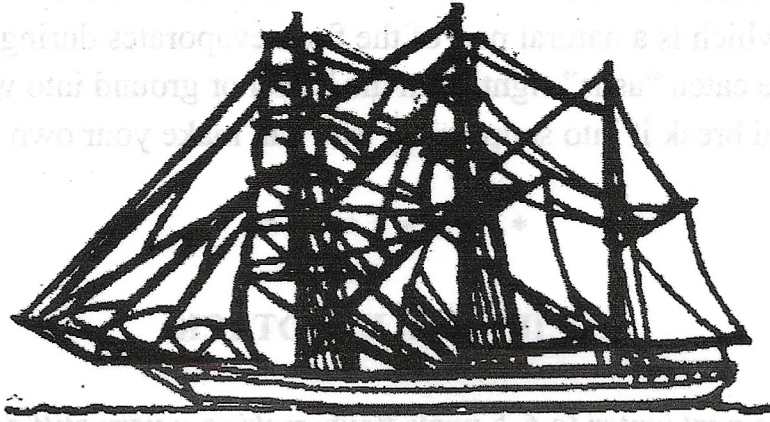

EASY WAYS TO GO GREENER AT HOME

Navy personnel assigned to environmental issues are called Environmental Health Officers. Be a junior environmental health officer at home. Here are some easy tips:

1. Plant an herb garden. It's good to have a reminder of where our food originates and this one is easy. You can plant in pots inside or outside. And, you can use them to flavor your food.
2. Don't overwater outside and make sure you don't over fertilize so it runs into a river or bay.
3. Stop using disposable bags. Ask your parent to order some reusable bags. They can be purchase at most grocery stores.
4. Buy an inexpensive reusable water bottle and stop buying plastic disposable bottles. Then watch *The Story of Bottled Water* (online), about the bottled water phenomena, with your family.
5. Switch light bulbs to CFLs. Turn off lights when you leave the room.
6. Encourage your parents to install recycle bins in your home. Follow the guidelines set by the county in which you live.
7. Don't turn on lights at all for as long as you can – open your curtains and enjoy natural light.
8. Turn off your computer completely at night.
9. Reuse scrap paper. Print on two sides or use the back side for coloring or making lists or taking telephone messages.
10. Check to see if you have leaky faucets in your house. If you do, ask your parent to fix them. It will save money. Don't let water run...turn off the faucet when brushing your teeth and shorten your showers.
11. Watch *The Story of Stuff* (online) with your family and talk about the impact your household trash has on our landfills.
12. Repurpose something. You can use a milk bottle to water plants, use empty paper towel rolls to store extension cords. Be imaginative. Make this a family project.
13. Use cloth instead of paper when you are helping to clean house, especially in the kitchen. Be frugal and make rags out of old towels and t-shirts.
14. Encourage your parents to use cloth napkins instead of paper.
15. Repurpose glass jars as leftover containers and bulk storage, especially in the kitchen.

RATIONS & RECIPES



What the American Sailor Ate During the American Revolution

Life aboard ship during the American Revolution was hard, at best, and the food was nothing short of awful. Salt was the only way of preserving meat and fish and bread, soup from dried peas, salt fish or salt beef. The most difficult commodity to store were beverages. Space had to be made for large quantities of fresh water, which after a time didn't taste all that fresh. Some ships sailed with beer, watered-down wine or watered-down rum, called grog.

Live chickens, pigs, cows or sheep sometimes supplied fresh meat and eggs on voyages and there was fresh fish when possible. The best food always landed on the captain's table. Before the 1750's it was common for messes of around seven sailors to dip into communal pots and wooden or pewter spoons. In the mid 1700's James Lind, a Scottish doctor identified fresh fruits and vegetables as the antidote to scurvy. In 1772 Captain Cook provisioned carrot marmalade along with orange and lemon juices.

The main staple of a sailor's diet was biscuits or hardtack. Whether round or square, the recipe was the same - flour and water, with the possible addition of salt and/or sugar. The finished bread weighed less than the flour from which it was made. This is because both the water used in mixing the dough and the water which is a natural part of the flour evaporates during the baking.

Ship bread could be eaten "as is" right from the barrel or ground into what is essentially matzo meal. Sailors would break it into soup or tea. You can make your own ship bread at home.

RECIPE FOR HARDTACK

Mix one part water to 6-5 parts flour, making a very stiff dough.

Salt adds to the taste and makes the dough easier to work.

*Roll out to about 3/8" thick, cut into 4" squares or rounds
and pierce them through in at least nine places. Bake 30 - 45 minutes in a moderate
oven until slightly browned and puffed.*

*You may need to leave the biscuits out to dry for a few days
until they are truly rock-hard*

**Be aware that hardtack is VERY hard. Soften in water
before eating (or dip into soup or tea)**

RECIPE FOR DRIED PEA SOUP

*Take one quart of dried (split) peas; put in three quarts of water
with three chopped onions. Add pepper and salt and boil for three hours.
Thicken with a large piece of butter and flour; put in slices of nice salt pork.
Boil until pork is done and serve it up with hardtack*

Over the next five decades Congress periodically altered the rations. Tea, pickles, cranberries, raisins, dried apples and other dried fruits made the common sailor's diet a little less grim.

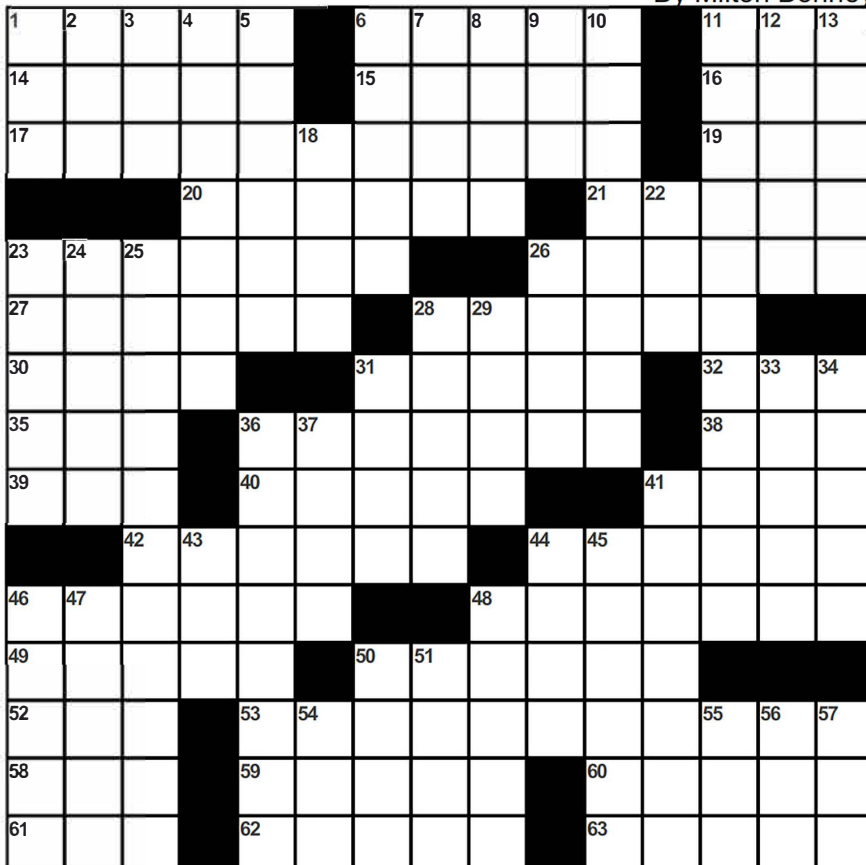
