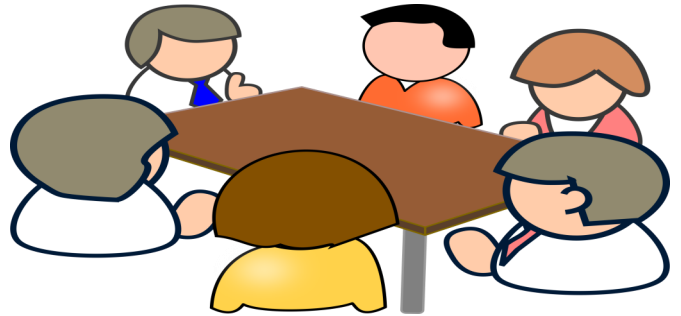

Nervous about joining a club? No need to be. I have only read one book so far and am grateful for the suggested reading. It was a page-turner.

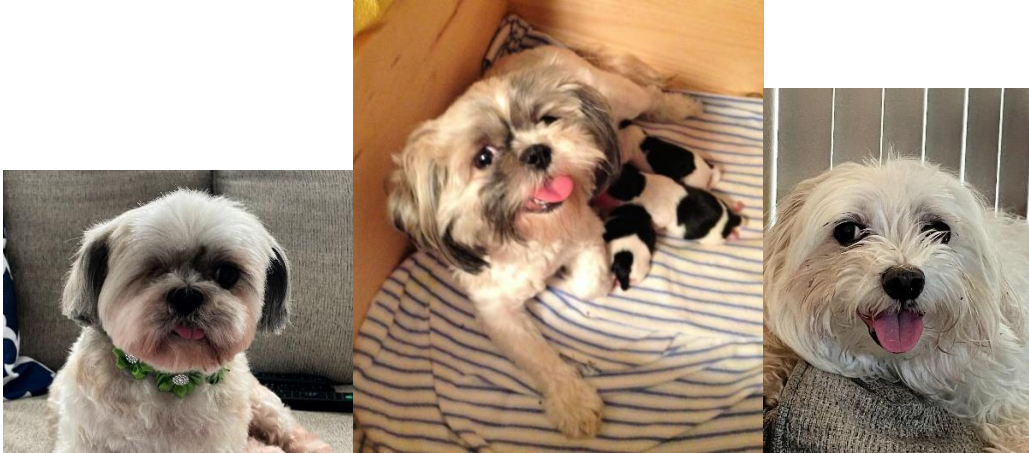
I had never joined a book club before and did not attend the last meeting, but when I did, I found it interesting to see the different takes on the story and the characters.

Hurricane Season Coming:

Snowbirds Depart Now is The Time to Start Preparing

Before getting to our article, I want to take a moment to mention that our Team will soon be losing two of our longstanding Team members who are also an important part of the LHV community.

Matt & Margaret Rice will be leaving soon to be closer to their family. Both Matt & Margaret have been extremely active in our LHV community over the years I have known them. Whenever there was an activity you would always see one or both of them helping. They were original members of our Team from the beginning and have always been available to help with anything we needed. They will be sorely missed in our community! All of us wish Matt & Margaret a smooth and happy transition and ongoing happiness in their new home. I speak for many when I say, **THANK YOU for all you have done! We wish you the best for the future! We will miss you!**

Hurricane Season begins June 1st and ends November 30th. Each year we are faced with almost six months of possible hurricane danger – watching the weather constantly. This is a reality of living in Florida, whether full time or as snowbirds.

Snowbirds Depart:

Our Snowbirds are in the process of leaving and by May 1 most will be gone. We wish all of them a safe journey. A recent Team survey indicated that about **20% of LHV residents are Snowbirds**. This translates to about forty (40) Snowbirds. It is hard to be precise as the situation is constantly changing, but 20% seems like a good estimate to work with.

For the past few years the Team has discussed **Snowbirds** and ways to help them before they leave and after they return. **Snowbirds leave before hurricane season begins and return during the peak hurricane season - August to October! The Team wants to be there for them at both times. When they return, we hope to provide information packets to them and offer any assistance we can.**

The Team held a **Special Meeting for Snowbirds and New Residents on April 10th from 1PM to 3PM**. The meeting was open to anyone. The date was chosen around other LHV activities. We know that some Snowbirds had already departed. However, we hoped for a good turnout for our event. We also targeted new residents. We did have some of both attend along with others from LHV and we thank all who attended and hope our information was helpful. The Team had speakers on different areas and lots of handouts and information put together by Team members. Overall, the attendance was very light.

The monthly **Team Meeting** was held on Thursday, April 26th. Since this is being written for Gator Tales deadline of April 20, the plan is to discuss **information gathering and distribution schedule for early June**, to go over Zone Map, etc. **The Team has not yet scheduled a June Open House, like in 2023.** After last year's Open House and our April event, the Team will discuss and evaluate future events, taking into account the low attendance and apparent lack of interest of many for these events.

NOW is The Time to Start Preparing:

Don't wait to pick up batteries, water, and nonperishable items. Right now, they are plentiful. Don't wait and find yourself in the same boat as 'Charlie the Procrastinator' shown below.

- * **Team members will carry ID's – lanyards with name tags.** So – if someone knocks at your door, ask to see their ID before talking with them. ID's will hopefully be issued to all Team members by our April 26th meeting. **Thanks to HOA President Carmine G for providing these lanyards for the Team!**
- * **National Hurricane Preparation Week is May 5-11, 2024**
- * **Florida Sales Tax Holidays are coming** – watch the LHV Facebook page. We will announce these. As of today, it looks like this is awaiting final approval from the Governor.
- * **National Hurricane Center Website for Weather;** Highly recommended by our Team: www.nhc.noaa.gov; lots of valuable information at your fingertips!

Arrive Alive

According to the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, speeding is a contributing factor in 26% of traffic fatalities nationwide. Just think, if everyone obeyed the speed limit, 26 of 100 lives would not have died needlessly.

Speeding greatly reduces a driver's ability to slow a vehicle when necessary or to navigate around curves or unexpected hazards, such as objects in the road, or standing water. Crashes caused by someone speeding are 100% preventable.

Earlier this month, a 3-year old lost her mother and a 5-year old lost both his grandparents when a 22-year old woman who was driving recklessly and speeding crashed head-on into a pickup truck. Just prior to the crash, she was witnessed by several motorists impatiently trying to pass other cars on a two lane highway while driving in excess of the speed limit. Had she just been patient and obeyed the rules of the road, a middle-aged couple would still be alive today – as well as that young mother who caused the crash. During our investigation we could find no emergency or extenuating circumstances that would have caused her to speed. Even if she had been dealing with some sort of external pressure to get to her destination quickly, there is still no logical reason to drive so recklessly without regard for her own life or the lives of others.

With so many more drivers on our roadway, it's even more important that we all take due care and diligence when getting behind the wheel of a vehicle. I like to compare a vehicle to a dangerous weapon – which it can be when used inappropriately. Aiming two tons of steel at an innocent person is no different than pointing a loaded gun at someone.

Please, for the sake of your life and your loved ones, obey the speed limits. Practice patience. Leave earlier than normal if you fear traffic will bog you down. Be courteous and kind. Don't drive impaired. Arrive alive.

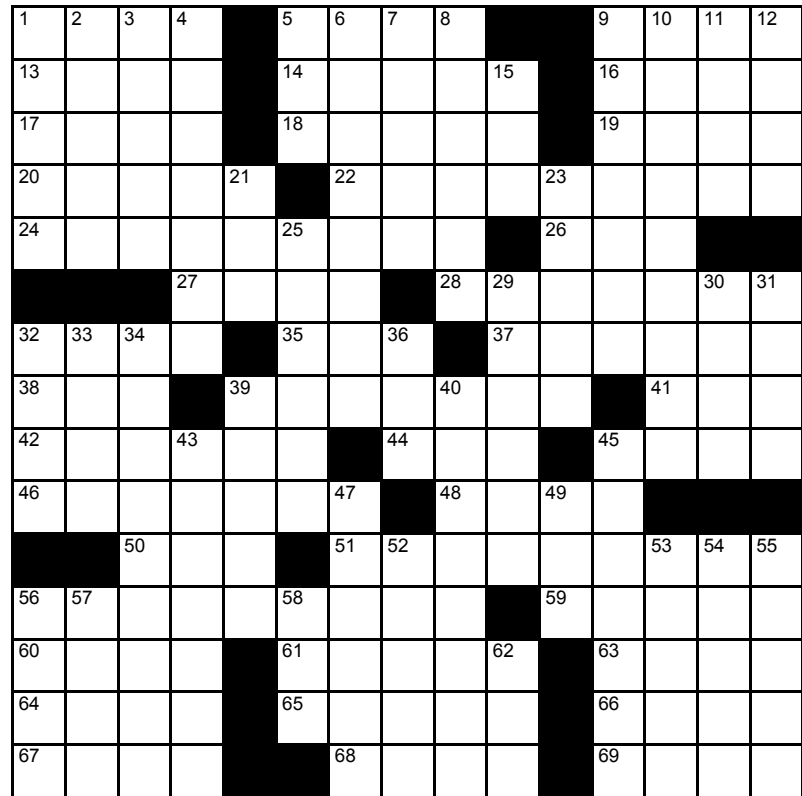
